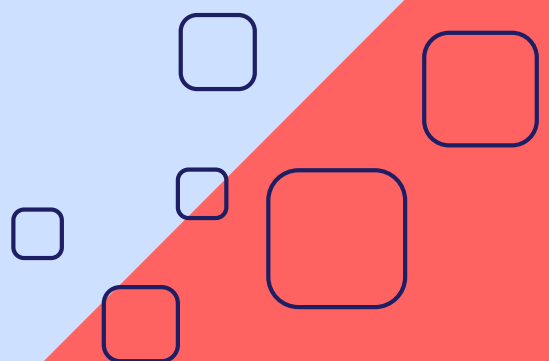

When can I go on SEP?

Each individual country will have their own timeline, however IPSF as a whole follows a 'Winter' and 'Summer' timeline. With Winter SEP running from October to March of the next year and Summer SEP running from April to September.

What are the benefits of going on SEP?

It is a unique opportunity to gain international pharmacy experience, explore different healthcare systems, and develop professional skills. It also offers cultural immersion, networking with global peers, and the chance to travel while learning.

What are the requirements of SEP?

It varies depending on where you are going but make sure you are a member of your local pharmacy student association, with that membership you also get complimentary memberships to NAPSA and IPSF, IPSF membership is required for SEP.

Will this interrupt my university studies?

No it shouldn't. We recommend that you attend this during your university breaks.

Does this contribute to credit points?

There is no affiliation with universities. IPSF is solely a platform to allow students an opportunity to experience global pharmacy.

How long can I do placement for?

The minimum requirement is 40 hours and maximum is only limited by availability of the hosting location.

What types of placements are there?

It depends on the location, of all the options available there are: hospital, community, research and industry pharmacy placements.

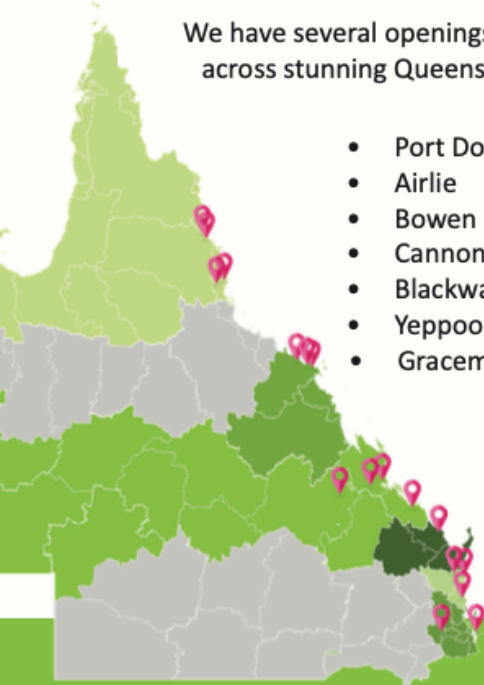

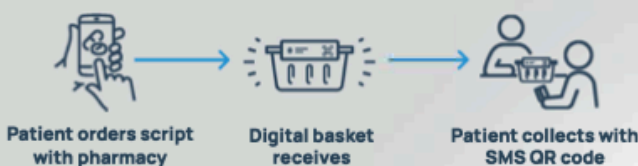
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AdPha at NAPSA Congress: Empowering Future Pharmacists

Digital health in pharmacy – what are your obligations?



Digital health tools and resources continue to evolve. Advancements in technology have led to significant improvement in patient care and efficiency. Students and interns should be mindful of their obligations when using such tools and resources.

Considerations before use:

- **Training** – complete training before utilising any unfamiliar digital health program. This may be formal or informal, theoretical or practical.
- **Authority** – authority may be legislative, or policy-based for your practice setting. There may also be access restrictions in place which limit users to components of a platform or allow access only under certain circumstances.
- **Privacy** – consider whether it is appropriate to access or provide the intended information. Consent from the patient may be required.
- **Accuracy** – information uploaded onto a digital health platform may be used to inform healthcare decisions by other practitioners. It is essential that records are accurate and the correct patient file is selected.

Common examples:

My Health Record (MHR)

MHR is an online summary of an individual's health information. It allows doctors, hospitals and certain other healthcare providers, including pharmacists, **involved in the individual's care** to view their health information.

MHR [training](#) should be completed prior to first use.

Access to a patient's MHR leaves a digital footprint that identifies the user, which records were accessed and when. Pharmacy staff who are not registered with Ahpra, e.g. students, should only access a patient's MHR if authorised by the pharmacy organisation's [security and access policy](#).

Real Time Prescription Monitoring (RTPM)

The RTPM is designed to monitor the prescribing and dispensing of controlled medicines with the aim of reducing their misuse in Australia. It arms prescribers and pharmacists with information regarding a patient's history and use of controlled medicines.

Interns are encouraged and, in some jurisdictions, required to register with their local RTPM. Students involved in the dispensing process may be familiar with RTPM pop-ups in their dispense software and should be mindful that the dispense record for monitored medicines will upload to the patient's Safescript record automatically.

Australian Immunisation Record (AIR)

The AIR is a national register that records vaccines given to all people in Australia. Immunisers must ensure a patient's AIR is checked **before** an immunisation is administered and the record of immunisation must be uploaded to the AIR **after** an immunisation is administered.

Artificial Intelligence (AI)

AI is rapidly becoming part of everyday life for patients and practitioners. Regardless of what technology is utilised, the pharmacist remains responsible for delivering safe and quality care and for ensuring their own practice meets the professional obligations set out in the [Ahpra Shared Code of Conduct](#).

As new digital health tools emerge, so do the unique practical and ethical issues associated with its use in a healthcare setting. Ahpra and the National Boards have developed [principles](#) for practitioners to consider when using or looking to integrate AI into their practice.

Case study

You are a student working in a community pharmacy. You dispense a prescription for medicinal cannabis under the wrong patient file with the same name but different address.

Some time later, a patient complains to the pharmacy that an incorrect record has been uploaded to Safescript and their prescriber is now refusing to prescribe pain relief for them.

Outcome

The pharmacist apologises to the patient. Upon investigation they identify the dispense error. The record is corrected and the prescriber is notified of the incident.

You review your dispensing process to ensure accuracy of all records. You reflect on the impact that errors can have on patient care, particularly when uploaded to a digital health platform.
